Subject terminology

- An adjective is a descriptive word.
- Juxtaposition is when a writer places two different ideas of things close together.

Language analysis

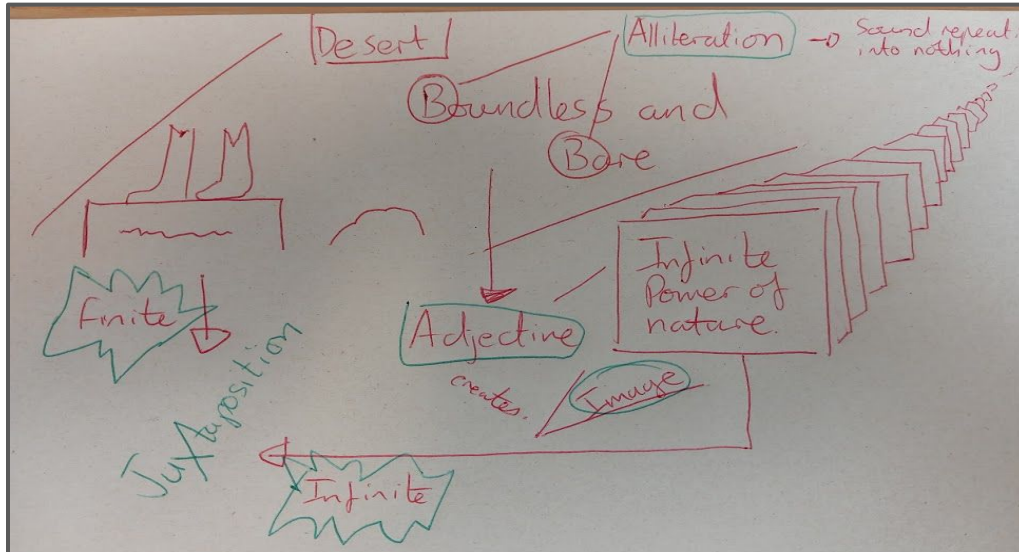
At the end of the poem, the narrator describes the desert as “boundless and bare” to create an image of the infinite power of nature.

The adjective “boundless” creates an image of something wide, limitless and infinite, whilst the alliteration of the letter “b” creates a hollow sound that underlines this impression of nothingness.

This juxtaposes with the image of Ozymandias’s statue, which is anything but infinite, and has not stood the test of time.

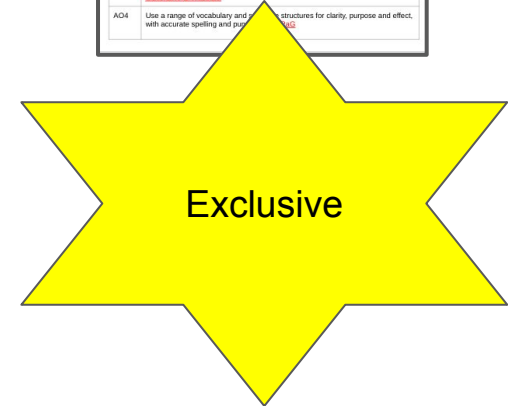

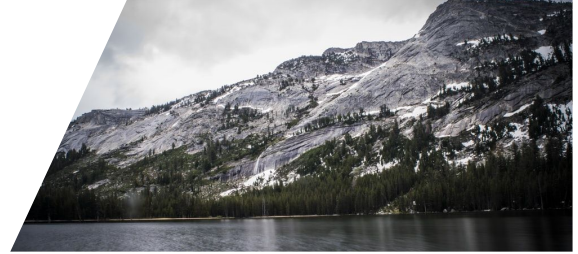

Writing needs to be **meaningful and mature**

- **A moment in time.**
- **A single scene.**
- Describe the experience.
- Have a perspective.

Show off language

Carefully crafted structure

Could I have a shark attack?

Could I use my story about a murder in a hidden shed in the forest?

Could I include an explosion?

Could I have someone drowning?



- You are not a Hollywood director or a writer for Hollyoaks
- Hyper exaggeration and sprawling plots won't work.

Revision Tip 14: how much?

The rule of 6

- 6 sentences per paragraph (try to use a range of sentence starters and lengths)
- 6 paragraphs per writing piece
- 6 'things' deliberately chosen in each paragraph
 - Specific noun; Powerful verb; Adjectives
 - Senses
 - Simile
 - Metaphor; Personification
 - Short dramatic impact sentence; deliberately long and tense sentence
 - Use of a semi-colon; colon



Revision Tip 15: Have a care

The opinions you given need to be more fully formed than a 20 second post!

You will have to write an opinion piece

What you are really doing is engaging with an issue

Repeating opinions you hold without really asking the difficult questions will not help

Discuss topics; debate; don't assume your opinions are common sense

Watch the news

BBC, not tik tok

Read the news

The Guardian, the BBC; not facebook

What kind of debate?

'Too many people become pet owners without thinking through the responsibility. They are not knowledgeable or skilled enough and they do not care for the needs of the animal. It is about time we changed our attitudes to owning a pet.'

"We don't take the dangers of technology seriously enough. Our obsession with technology has damaged the world when and destroyed childhood, when it was supposed to make life better."

'Schools need to be given the time and resources to provide a wider range of opportunities for young people to be able to succeed once they leave. The current education system doesn't prepare you for life.'
